Japanese-Australian visual artist Hiromi Tango offers her joyful, heart expanding artwork to both the stage design and costumes for this sublime new performance, featuring lighting design by Niklas Pajanti.

Reviews

Wayfinder is a glorious, chromatic frenzy of dance and acrobatic movement, created by KylePage and Amber Haines, the artistic and associate artistic directors of Townsville's Dancenorth.It's a jubilant mess of a show and impossible to resist.

In beautifully gaudy costumes, the ensemble of seven streams through the space likeprismatically dispersed sunshine. On a foam stage that gives them extra bounce, they tumbleand flip and pop in a riot of waving limbs and big Townsville smiles.

Wayfinder offers a uniquely kinaesthetic experience. You can feel the performance in your ownbody. The feeling of bouncing, cartwheeling and tumbling on grass is stirred irresistibly in themuscles – no matter how distant the recalled memory.

Central to the experience is a pile of multi-coloured ropes that drop impressively from theceiling at the beginning of the show. These create a sense of disorder that is the perfect settingfor the exuberance of the performances.

The dancers wrap each other in these ropes, they bury themselves in them, connect with themand strew them across the stage.

The soundtrack is a collaboration between Bryon J Scullin and the progressive Melbourne-based artfunk quartet Hiatus Kaiyote. The music, with its big beats, vocal acrobatics and constantly changing rhythms, suggests a week-long party compressed into an hour. The stage design, by artist Hiromi Tango, includes a towering technicolour sculpture thatappears during a rare quiet moment. This marvellous swamp-gothic column provides a visual constant, holding the scene together as the party becomes a carnival in its final act.

There's also a novel sound and light sculpture created by Robert Larsen and Nicholas Roux, which is distributed throughout the theatre. This is composed of glowing globes about the sizeof honeydew melons with individually programmed audio.

Are there too many gimmicks? The multi-coloured fabric, the trampoline floor, the strobelighting effects, the glowing balls that sing at you and everything else? Is it all too much?Perhaps, but that's the joy of Wayfinder. It revels in its excess.

Unfortunately, the Melbourne season at the Alexander Theatre was two nights only, which isnot enough for such a crowd-pleaser of a show.

Later this month, the company will take Wayfinder to Mexico City for the Festival Internacional Santa Lucia.

Before then, however, this Friday and Saturday, Dancenorth will be lighting up the Geelong ArtsCentre. Go and see them if you can. Go and chase this remarkable burst of happiness inrainbows all the way to Geelong. You won't be sorry.

Thinking about what was the best show at last year's Brisbane Festival I would have to say it was Townsville-based contemporary dance company Dancenorth's RED. Dancers disrobing in a giant deflating bubble ... what's not to love about that?

But could they do it again this year while keeping theirs clothes on? The company is on a roll, like the North Queensland Cowboys. What's going on in Townsville? Must be something in the water.

The answer is a resounding YES and everyone coming out of Wednesday's opening night at Brisbane Powerhouse reckoned they had just seen the hit of the festival. Mind you it was unclear what we had just seen.

All I know is that from the moment the lights hit the stage in the Powerhouse Theatre Dancenorth's new show Wayfinder kicked into high gear and stayed there. All seven of the Townsville-based company's dancers were on stage in this work created by that dynamic duo of Kyle Page and Amber Haines. It's a colourful show and put that down to the collaboration with artist Hiromi Tango who designed it and created a kind of moving wool installation that the dancers get caught up in, literally. Oh what a tangled web they weave, and an intriguing one, as they ravel and unravel 65 km of wool and dance with such energy and joy that there is not one dull moment in the whole show. Mind you there are some meditative moments too when the dancers become like bodhisattvas at one stage.

Transcendental. It's a word from the 1960s but it suits this incredible production which has the most amazing soundscape by Byron J. Scullin who collaborated with Melbourne band Hiatus Kaiyote to create music and sound that goes from mellow to full funk at times. The lighting design by Niklas Pajanti is way cool too.

Set on a custom-made inflatable stage, the heart of the production is two symbolic centrepieces historically associated with hope: the beacon and the rainbow. The work's title explains the first – represented in the form of 100 coconut-sized "pearls" used onstage and throughout the auditorium – while the latter serves as a recurrent motif, devised in collaboration with visual artist Hiromi Tango.

Taken together, alongside movement, music, costumes, set and lighting, the aesthetic is one of wonder, awe and joy, with a playful energy that's so infectious new dancegoers will be swept up too.

Wayfinder's immersive pearls and rainbows evoke both nature and novelty, offering a surprising interactive treat. They generate community among the seated strangers watching who share spontaneous exchanges, and also among the 150 volunteer finger-knitters, who pulled together 70km of salvaged wool creations for the show.

The sound design is another inspired collaboration, between Bryon J Scullin, Grammy-nominated Australian four-piece band Hiatus Kaiyote and its Melbourne-based lead singer, Nai Palm. It interweaves six tracks (Atari, Prince Minikid, Shaolin Monk, Motherfunk, Rose Water, Canopic Jar and Get Sun are interwoven) alongside Nai Palm's siren song of bespoke ethereal vocalisations.

Often contemporary dance is set to mechanical sounds that can be alienating; this soundtrack is a welcome change. The languid vibe, warm melodies and hip grooves are entrancing, contrasting with energised percussive sections mirrored in hyperkinetic dance moves. Natural organic sounds inspire simple yet redolent imagery that fires the imagination: the dancers lying in a collapsed domino formation use their arms to conjure bird wings, multi-limbed insects and weightless sea creatures.

It's rewarding to see a collaboration among such diverse talents achieve such unity of purpose. Wayfinder is a rare offering that excites, entertains and enriches.

Dancenorth Australia explodes with colour and movement in an opening sequence that bursts with the energy of youth. The young company of dancers erupt in a tribal celebration of clan pulsating with free abandon. It is the street dance of the young generation thrusting and pulsating with the defiance and individuality of their tribe. It is also the rite of passage of the new generation, seeking out the light, and discovering their way through life and stamping their identity through the vitality of their dance.

Wayfinder is at times contagiously exuberant and at other times, pensive and questioning. Confidence and doubt create a thread through the work. At times choreographers Amber Haines and Kyle Page weave patterns of a close and reliant community and at other times during the journey in solo work and floor work expose the fear and uncertainty of the doubtful mind. The performance is backed by jazz/punk band Hiatus Kaiyote and their song Get Sun is an expression of the doubting heart. This is the world of angst and confusion. In a performance striving for answers, the dancers move through moments of self-expression, reliance on the group and finally a celebration of arrival at acceptance.

Dancenorth's WAYFINDER recontextualises contemporary dance. It presents a visceral argument and affirmation for the human condition, both generally and in the apparently current strife torn times. Born in the constraints of Covid, the choreographic couple Amber Haines and Kyle Page, with designer Hiromi Tango, lighting by Niklas Pajanti, and arresting compositions by Hiatus Kaiyote, barely dwell on the negatives instead reaching out for connection with nature that will transcend historical or personal frailty. In doing so they remap the dominant commitment of contemporary or modern dance to abstraction, as it liberated the human body from narrative constraints of classical dance or dance in music theatre. Suddenly colour is back. Along with happiness, connection, joy. Dance is to be enjoyed, in a profoundly produced form only possible by the rigour, insights and sheer hard work of regional Townsville based Dancenorth and its superb performing team.

The result is not romanticism, not a celebration of nature out there. It is the embodiment of natural form, a rich tapestry of images, movements and effects. What a generous gift to its audiences.

Production

CREW REQUIREMENTS

Bump In Crew: 2 x LX, 2 x SND, 2 x MX, 1 x WRD Running Crew: 1 x LX, 1 x SND, 1 x MX, 1 x WRD Bump Out Crew: To be confirmed with venue.

EXAMPLE SCHEDULE - STAND ALONE SEASON

PEARLS

100 light and sound emitting pearls are pre-set throughout the auditorium. Held by audience members, each pearl contains a speaker which acts as a cipher for an individual human voice, creating an intimate sonic experience. When acting together, they also function as an aural body that condenses and expands across the auditorium. The pearls also create an immersive lighting installation. FOH and crew may need to assist with distribution and collection pre- and post-performance.

STAGING

Designed for a proscenium or black box venue, the work takes place on a 8m x 8m inflatable floor centrally positioned on a 12m x 12m black tarkett surface. The work contains a second 5m x 2m printed inflatable set piece, a flown set piece and a manually operated drop.

LIGHTING

The lighting design creates crisp and clear performance zones using a specific rig outlined in the Technical Specifications (profiles, strobes, and moving specials).

AUDIO

In addition to the Pearls, show content is playback only using an on-stage sound system, with a delay to the FOH system.

WARDROBE

Costume requirements include steaming pre-show and laundering post-show. Repairs experience appreciated.

REHEARSAL & WARM UP

A separate warm-up space is required for the dancers – this space should be a minimum of 8m x 8m and ideally have a sprung tarkett floor. A small PA with jack input is required. Access to showers, basic kitchen facilities and a fridge is required.

FREIGHT

The show can be air, road or sea freighted dependent on the presenting location.

Knitting Sittings

Finger-knitting is a simple somatic and creative practice, and these sessions will suit anyone with an interest in visual arts, performing arts, props and set design, textile crafts, and quiet and conscious ways of connecting with people through arts and crafts. Simple instructions, good chats, cups of tea and light refreshments are supplied at each workshop. Dancenorth warmly welcomes people of all abilities and ages.

A DANCE WORKSHOP FOR SCHOOL STUDENTS

Rhythm and Resonance

Students will embark on fun and engaging tasks learning clever patterns and systems that give brain twisting parameters to guide the creation of rhythm hitting dance. The students are also invited to engage with colourful finger knitting strands created by local community that feature in Wayfinder. These kinetic extensions of movement allow for wild and unruly tactile feedback. Led by Dancenorth's spectacular Wayfinder cast, this exuberant workshop is a sure fire way to engage young hearts, minds and bodies. Duration = 1 hour
